Words of Prayer

At St Peter's School, we aim to provide children with the language of prayer, i.e. praising, thanking, asking, saying sorry, meditation and quiet reflection.

Formal Words for Prayer

Children become familiar with prayers by:

- Joining in with class prayers and Collective Worship.
- Singing hymns.
- Joining in with the Penitential Rite, Bidding Prayers, responses and Eucharistic Prayers in whole school masses.
- Making up their own prayers for class Masses and Collective Worship.
- Valuing the time given in class for their own quiet reflection.
- Joining the school and parish family by saying the Rosary and Stations of the Cross before school during Lent, and in the month of October.

Children can be introduced to the gestures of prayers by:

- Making the Sign of the Cross.
- Genuflecting.
- Crossing their heads, lips and heart in preparation to receive the Gospel
- Bowing their heads.
- Joining their hands.
- Holding and shaking hands.
- Carrying out gesture or sign language to reflect the words of a prayer

Opportunities for quiet, reflective prayer and stilling exercises will be given where possible or appropriate. The children have opportunity to go and pray at morning break.

Prayers that the Children Know.

We all have our own favourite prayers that we say with our classes. By the time the children reach Y6, they will have been introduced to a variety of different prayers and have the experience of personal and spontaneous prayer. Children will have begun to have responsibility for preparing liturgies.
